Artists Statements

Covid Good Wishes

This series of small and multi-layered linocuts, has been made during the past 4 months of Naarm/Melbourne's long second lockdown. During Covid 19, which has had a gruelling impact upon my Disabled life, I have found solace by deep diving into my lifelong love of postage stamps, postmarks and envelopes with their varying inner pale blue patterns.

Each of these postcard sized artworks and delicate paper cranes, incorporate many individual linocuts, as well as carefully chosen Australian postage stamps. The long slow process of lino carving seemed to match and even harmonise with the warped sense of time and isolation that Covid restrictions brought to Melbourne.

Each of these artworks were also made for various print exchanges, meaning that they have been sent around the world via sea mail post to swap with other artists. These paper cranes represent my hope for a fair and just recovery for the planet and all on it. There is an ancient Japanese legend that promises that if you fold one thousand paper cranes, you will be granted a wish by the gods. I am still folding.

I wish you all the health you desire, strong connections to those that you love, creativity to grow compassion and the courage to make a difference as we rebuild and recover.
