
Art Day South: 30 Years Catalogue

In December 2005 Art Day South presented a major theatre piece The Past Is Under Glass at Theatreworks, St Kilda. Growing out of an idea to explore poetry, the group devised an evocative multimedia performance and accompanying screen print exhibition. Participants were involved in all areas of the production from writing and performing poetry and music; designing and making props, sets and costumes; and creating screen prints for the exhibition.


Jo Cohen, studio coordinator at the time, wrote: "Poetic verses spilled from the blue coloured lips of the Victorian-costumed performers as they shared glimpses into their lives filled with joy and sadness. Animated words were projected into the blackness, accompanied by pre-recorded voiceovers and a range of performance interpretations, from small and intimate, to large and raucous. Delightful moments of trust and knowledge of each other passed between the performers with a disability and those without, whilst the audience looked on in appreciation."

In 2009 the studio developed a distinctive style exemplified by its crowning work - Head Case, a highly inventive short film exploring the "spaghetti western" genre. The creativity, tone and dark humour displayed in the film is distinctively 'Art Day South".

In 2009 the studio worked on a large collaborative sculptural work that was installed in Frankston Art Centre's Cube 37 Gallery in March 2009. Installation by day, projection space by night, Dragon Breath & The Cloak is video and sculptural exploration of the story of St George and the Dragon, rendering the tale from the perspective of the dragon. This work is development of the group's seminal performance piece Dragon Eggs, first created in December 2007.



A first of its kind, Nebula is a purpose-built, portable arts space that enables artists with a disability to create and show their work in a space designed for them. The idea was germinated by Art Day South's artists who developed the concept and initial drawings for architect Andrew Maynard and engineer Michael Whytlaw.

Nebula was launched in conjunction with ACMI's William Kentridge exhibition in March 2012 with a week of art making workshops and public tours of the new space.

In the same year, Art Day South studio was chosen to create and showcase work for the Gertrude Street Projection Festival, this year being awarded a \$2000 commission. Artist Joceline Lee, as part of her JUMP Mentorship through The Australia Council for the Arts, worked as an Artist in Residence in the Melbourne Museum's Paleontology Collection, culminating in a solo exhibition at Federation Square. Artists Kristy Sweeney and Joceline Lee were chosen to showcase bodies of work in AART.BOXX exhibition in Sydney.

Nebula took up residency at Southgate on Melbourne's Yarra in March 2013 for performances of Singular, a new theatrical production developed by Art Day South in partnership with the acclaimed RAWCUS Theatre Company.

Art Day South artists took part in the Gertrude Street Projection Festival for the fourth year running, presenting their collaborative animation work, Loser, and had their work exhibited at contemporary arts gallery, Lamington Drive, in Collingwood. The opening of this exhibition saw the launch of Edward Treloar's Alphabet, an illustrated book aimed at young children featuring Edward's unique paintings. Twenty-one works were sold during the exhibition.

With the help of sound artist Alice Hui Sheng Chang, the group explored drawn scores from a variety of differing cultures as well as those from avant-garde composers. The resulting video work Score, was screened on the window of Northside Records at the Gertrude Street Projection Festival in July 2013.

Art Day South's major project in 2015/16 was a large-scale weaving project, created on oversize stick loom woven panels using recycled fabric and found natural objects from their local outdoor spaces.


Beyond engaging the artists with their local environment, the project facilitated a truly collaborative work; artists who may not have always been able to interact on group projects due to social and sensory sensitivities were able to participate through contributing individually crafted pieces to integrate into the larger work.

The project was an integral part of Nebula's Outside the Square residency and was ultimately exhibited at the City of Kingston's Inclusion Matters exhibition, an International Day of People with Disability event.

The Nest participatory art project was presented in two parts; firstly, in conjunction with Emerald Hill Arts Menu festival and secondly at Dingley Neighbourhood Centre. The Nest project invited audience members to make a wish and present it to a giant sculptural nest adorned with feathers and bead work made by the group.

In the second half of 2017, Art Day South began to develop a new body of work through the introduction of a range of instruments and recording devices. Participant artists explored their own interests in performance and the process resulted in an extensively recorded sound and video archive of rehearsed and improvised performative events that had taken place throughout the year. Much of this material was presented at the Arts Day South open studio in December where participant's families and friends enjoyed a mini cinema and a display of participant artist's drawings, paintings, sculptures, sets and costumes.

The Go Have a look exhibition took place at the Kingston Arts Centre over August and September of 2018. The exhibition was a culmination of painted sets, wall works, and multiple video and sound works - a highly saturated immersive environment that juxtaposed the multiplicity of skills and interests that the artists brings to the studio. The gallery entrance became a stage of community announcements and artists used it as a platform to express their frustrations of the world. Art Day South artists also used the exhibition as an open studio, and created work within the gallery. Audiences were invited to join it and create art alongside the exhibiting artists.

Nebula was stationed at Malthouse Theatre for The Other Film Festival, and Art Day South contributed over an hour of short films to the program.



2020 to 2021

With the advent of lockdown, 2020 saw Art Day South transition to the online world. From their homes, artists joined each other through Zoom, and were encouraged to explore new ways of working online and from afar. The studio continues to work online when in lockdown, and in their Dingley Village studio when out of lockdown.

In 2020, Art Day South was commissioned by Bayside City Council to produce a series of public art sculptures for a brand new accessible playground at Thomas St Reserve.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the artists worked on this project remotely, coming together on Zoom each Friday. The studio artists each developed small clay sculptures of fantastical creatures, some of which you can see in this exhibition. The group then worked collaboratively with Mark Cuthbertson and Rhian Hinkley to produce 6 sculptures that contained parts of each artist's individual sculptures. Mark and Rhian turned those 6 sculptures into human-size concrete creatures that were installed at Thomas St Reserve's new accessible playground.
