In 2025 we are proud to celebrate the 21st Birthday of TOFF!

As part of our 21st birthday celebrations we have chosen to highlight storytelling from our local communities. With screening programs and events from 16 November – 3 December 2025.

For many Deaf and Disabled people our screen work is more than just storytelling. It's evidence. It's advocacy. It disrupts assumptions and resets stereotypes. It creates solidarity and community. It addresses cultural inequities and the deep pain of not seeing ourselves reflected back in the world. Screen and cultural participation and practice can be a vehicle for expression, resilience, transformation or even survival. Storytelling can be an act of reclaiming power, sharing experiences and shifting ideologies. A way to create a sense of pride and belonging.

TOFF is Australia's first international disability film festival. Since 2004, it has become a leader in the global disability screen advocacy movement. The Other Film Festival champions Deaf and Disabled-led and authored work. Acknowledging also the vital role of allyship in the screen industry to make change together.

TOFF is a Major Project of Arts Access Victoria (AAV). AAV is the state's peak body for arts and disability. Since 1974, AAV has been a leader in disability arts practice, access and cultural equity. AAV is disability-led. AAV produces and platforms the work of Deaf and Disabled artists.

Hearing Loop

There are hearing loops at select venues in the festival.



Audio Description

Audio description provides commentary to describe body language, expressions, movements, key action and the visual content of the film. Narration occurs during the natural pauses in the audio, and sometimes during dialogue if deemed necessary.

TOFF is a mask friendly festival. We will provide mask for anyone who would like to use one.



Renting Films on Cinema 3

You can rent the films until 3 December. You will not be able to access the content after this. Click the buttons under each film to rent the individual films. Or you can go to Cinema 3.


- 1. Choose a film to watch or explore, when you hover over a film you can click "Rent \$0.00"
- 2. This prompts to set up an account with Cinema 3 with an email address
- 3. Once email address is entered, you will need to enter your name
- 4. Create a Password and enter again to confirm it
- 5. You can read Terms and Conditions for setting up an account
- 6. There is then some information to read about the free rental and the time periods to watch within. You then agree to rent; and accept the terms
- 7. You are then taken to another screen. This screen has information about the rental period, and the time you have to watch the film
- 8. The same screen also says "Success a receipt has been emailed to you." There is also a link to view "System Requirements" at this stage, which you can do to see if your device will work
- 9. If you click the "System Requirements" link, it will take you to the "Help & FAQ" page. You can scroll down to read the requirements You will then receive two emails from "Cinema 3 ACMI"
- 10. The first email will thank you for joining
- 11. The second email is a "Purchase Receipt" but because it is free all the amounts on the receipt are \$0.00. There is a Watch Now button in the email




